Unfortunately, we couldn't find any bears on this trip but did see lots of Bald Eagles, Seals, and Sea Birds. Because of this we mostly stayed in calmer waters and were not able to locate any whales but we did see many Sea Otters, Harbour Seals, and Sea Birds, and some Sea Lions.




