



**Bella Coola Trip Sept. 20-23 SD73
International Student Program**



Twenty students plus chaperones left Kamloops at 7:00am Sept. 20, 2024. Our chartered bus turned west to Cache Creek, north to William's Lake, and then west again all the way to Bella Coola. We arrived at the Belarko Grizzly Bear Viewing Platform at 4:45pm after crossing the Chilcotin Plateau and descended the hill into the Bella Coola Valley. On the drive, we recorded 3 Black Bears, 1 Muskrat, 1 Yellow-pine Chipmunk, 1 Red Fox, 2 White-tailed Deer, and 2 Mule Deer. We saw loads of salmon but no Grizzly Bears at the wildlife platform during our 1 hour there. We then drove the last 45 minutes to Bella Coola and checked into our accommodations at the Cumbrian Inn and the Bella Coola Cabins. We then went to sleep early in preparation for the next day's activities.



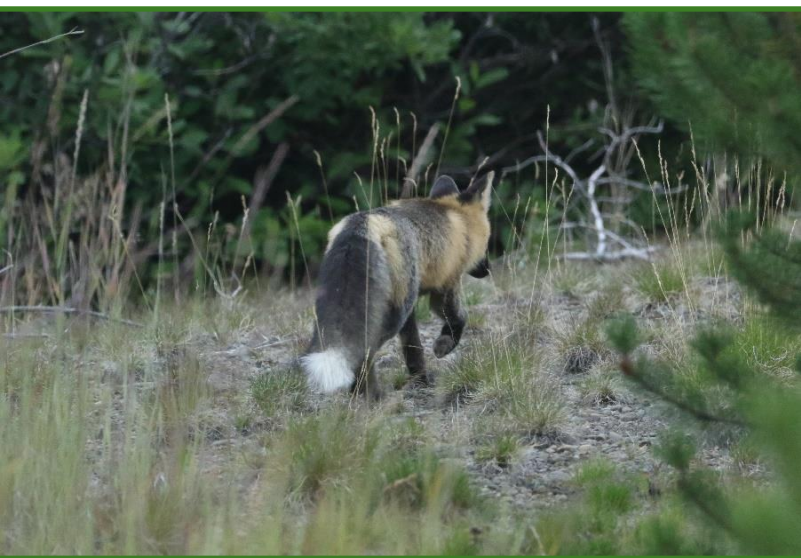

The next morning we met at 8:30am and drove a short ways to our first activity, the petroglyph hike. Hereditary Chief Noel Pootlass guided our hike to see the ancient petroglyphs.



After the petroglyphs, we visited a place where fish cutting and preparation happens. Some smoked salmon was also served. One of the dogs at this location had puppies to hold as well.

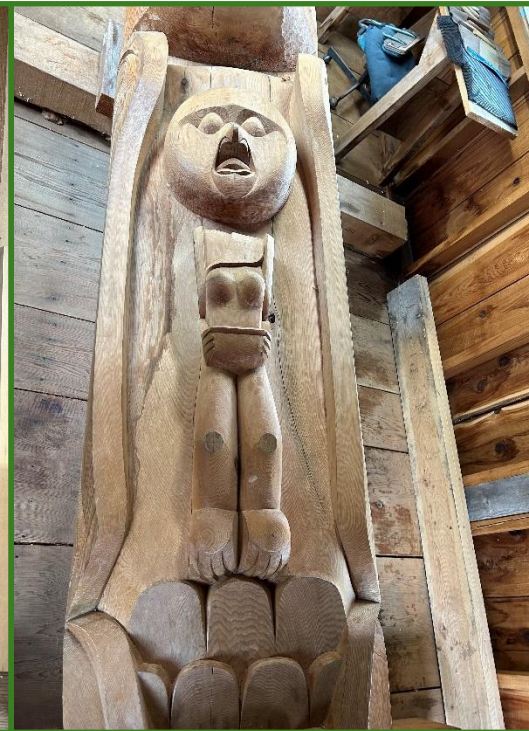


Due to better weather than predicted, we snuck in a quick trip to the ocean before lunch. At the ocean, we saw Clayton Falls and some Harbour Seals. We did not have much time there before driving back to town for lunch.



After lunch we had a visit with master carver Alvin Mack. He spoke to us about Residential School trauma and showed us some of his carvings. Students were also able to use an elbow adze to try their hand at removing wood.

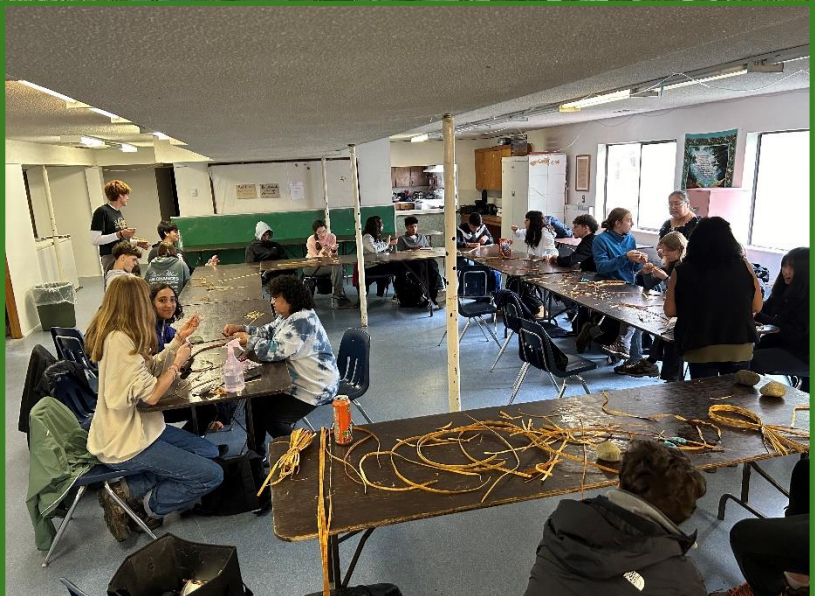




We then drove a short ways to Snootli Creek Regional Park where there are some giant old growth Cedar Trees.



Next, we drove to an area to check out where we planned to fish the next day. We planned to go back to the Grizzly Bear platform for dusk, but the bus ended up getting stuck which took some time to resolve. It was getting dark by the time we got out, so we went back to our accommodations for the night. The next morning, we left at 8:30 and headed back to the ocean. We saw some seals that were out of the water, but it was raining so hard that we ended up back in town and opted for a longer lunch break than planned. At 12:00pm we had our Nuxalk traditional cedar weaving activity with master weaver Barb. The students enjoyed making bracelets, head bands, and other items out of woven cedar bark. This is always such a fun activity for the students.





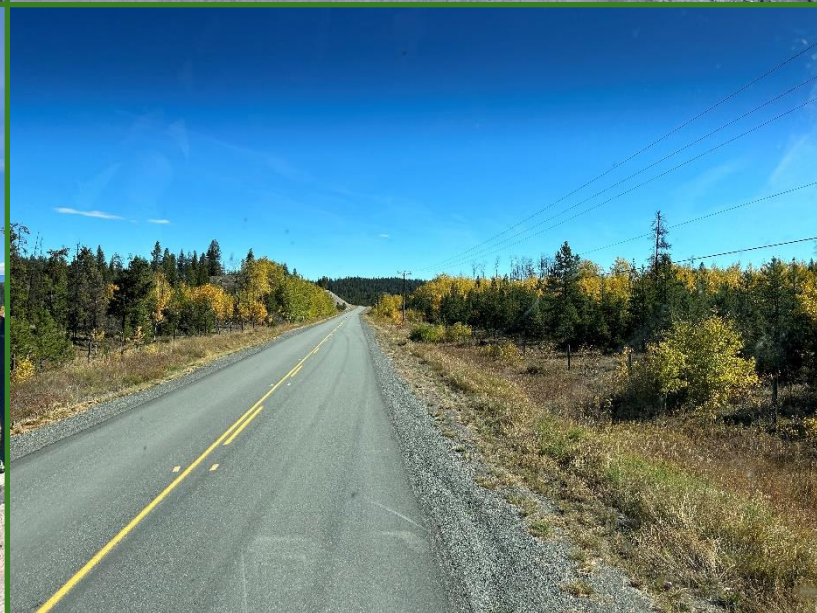
Due to the extreme rain in the area the previous day and night, the river where we were going to fish had risen steadily and was close to overflowing its banks. We made the decision that this would not be a safe activity so switched to having a campfire by the ocean and roasting hot dogs and making smores. The rain stopped for this and the rising clouds revealed many waterfalls coming off the mountains around us.





We then drove the one hour to the Grizzly Bear viewing platform and saw a large male Grizzly catch a couple of salmon and eat them right in front of us. The Grizzlies were not moving around much due to a record salmon return in the area and were therefore more difficult to see on this trip. We were happy to finally see one on our last night.





The next day we left Bella Coola at 7:00am and went back up the hill to the Chilcotin Plateau and on to Kamloops. We were treated to gorgeous fall colours for the majority of the drive.
