





**Jasper and Banff Trip May 30 – June 2, 2025  
SD73 International Student Program**




On May 30, 2025, 30 students and 3 chaperones left Kamloops at 7:00am and drove north up the Yellowhead Highway towards Jasper National Park. We had a short food and washroom stop in Clearwater and then an early lunch stop in Valemount before turning east and passing Mount Robson. We were delighted that there were very few clouds in the area, so we were able to see most of this 4000m mountain, the highest in the Canadian Rockies. We stopped for the traditional sign photo on this trip. Most of Mt. Robson can be seen to the left of the sign on the photo below.





Our first stop upon arriving in Jasper was the Sky Tram. Having received a tip about a Grizzly Bear in the Jasper area, we searched a known location on the way to the Sky Tram and, sure enough, a single adult Grizzly was seen.



The view from the top of the Sky Tram was incredible and some of the students hiked a short way to the ridge at the top. The Sky Tram brings you to above the treeline and there was still some snow around up there.



We then checked into our hotel in Jasper, had almost two hours of free time for dinner and grocery shopping before meeting at 7:30 for our first dusk wildlife drive. This drive turned out to be fantastic with views of Elk, Bighorn Sheep, Mule Deer, 2 Black Bear, a female and two older Grizzly Bear cubs, and an active Bald Eagle nest.



The next morning, we did a wildlife drive from 6-8am but did not see much other than a Trumpeter Swan nest, more Mule Deer, and an Elk carcass.



After a quick breakfast we had our float tour on the Athabasca River. The river level was up so we glided along quickly.



After this we had a lunch break before our afternoon visit to Athabasca Falls. We spent around 45 minutes enjoying this falls and the surrounding area.




After the float tour we had some free time for grocery shopping and dinner. We left our hotel at 7:00pm in the rain for our dusk wildlife drive later that day. We saw the same 3 Grizzly Bears, a Moose, and some birds around Maligne Lake on that drive.




The next morning, we left our hotel at 9:00am and headed south towards Banff. We had a scheduled Columbia Icefields Adventure Tour at 11:00. This tour included riding out on the glacier with the large ice explorer buses and being able to get off and walk on the Athabasca Glacier. This tour also included walking on the Sky Walk, a glass-floored bridge that is 280m above the canyon bottom below. The temperature was cooler here and it snowed off and on.








After our glacier experience, we drove the last 1.5 hours to Lake Louise, checked into our hostel, and headed to Banff for dinner and shopping. We saw some Bighorn Sheep and a large Black Bear along the road just south of the glacier and then another adult Grizzly Bear walking along the wildlife fence between Lake Louise and Banff.





We drove the Bow Valley Parkway on the way back to Lake Louise that night as a wildlife drive but saw almost nothing. The next morning we left our hostel at 9:00am and went the short distance to see Lake Louise. It was completely ice free this year and the sun was out, showing why this is such a famous lake. After this we drove back to Kamloops with a stop for lunch in Revelstoke and a few washroom breaks along the way. We arrived back in Kamloops at 5:00pm.
